Will Short School Reopen?

As a result of rising enrollment in K-8 grades in the last three school years, the School District is considering the reopening of Short School for elementary school children. Because the current 2009-10 student enrollment for grades K-8 exceeds 4,000 students the District is utilizing every classroom space available at their open schools. Since Short School is a viable facility and has been unused for a number of years the Board feels that it should be considered as a means to relieve this surge in student enrollment.

At the present time no decision or action has been taken and the District is anxious to keep the Gerstle Park neighborhood aware of plans that are being considered. The decision to reopen Short School will be made by the Board of Education at one of their regularly scheduled meetings. In any event, they do not expect that a recommendation will be brought before the Board before January of 2010. A Walk on the Wild Side

The old rock quarry is just up the hill above Gerstle Park and although many of the older houses in our neighborhood were built with rock taken from it scarcely anyone knows its there. On 10 October Hugo Landecker led a group of Gerstle Park residents on a walk through our open space, which encompasses the area from D street to Clorinda and from Upper Toyon down to Gerstle Park. The old rock quarry was one of the points of interest. Some of the participants had never been on the open space before and were not aware that it existed. Others were experienced hikers. Everyone had a wonderful time.

The walk began at the top of Grove Street where the trail begins. Although it was once covered with French Broom the trail has been cleared and its now an entry into the paths that wend through the wooded hillside above the Park. Hugo explained how the French Broom, aside from hiding the paths, represents a serious fire hazard during warm summer months. The path soon joins a dirt fire road that starts at the lower part of D Street just after the beginning of the grade and continues through the woods, past the site of the old rock quarry to the end of Makin Grade. Along the way we met people walking their dogs and Hugo told of occasional overnight “campers” who sometimes spend nights in the wooded nooks above the trail until they are asked to leave by police who patrol the open space at night.

Leaving the trail at Makin Grade, the group continued up hill on the street to Upper Toyon and then to the right on Upper Toyon through gates that warned us that we were entering a “private roadway.” We hoped that this would not deter others who would like to enjoy this pleasant journey, for the road continues through a lovely redwood grove to the end of Upper Toyon where we once again reached a pathway and began our descent down the hillside. This pathway soon branches, with one fork continuing left around the hillside to Spring Grove Avenue and on down into the residential area. Our group took the right branch of the pathway and soon emerged at the top of Clorinda street and continued down Clorinda and back to our starting point at the foot of Grove Street.

Although it wasn't included in our open space walk, Hugo told us about a trail, very much frequented by dog walkers and hikers, that begins on Upper Toyon just beyond the “private roadway” gate and continues downhill to meet the end of Greenwood Street. It is an easy trail that few know exists and all should try. It is the only remaining fragment of the old stage coach road, dating from the late nineteenth century, that joined San Rafael and the then resort town of Bolinas on the coast.

In mid-October property owners closed off the lower part of this trail and although the problem has since been resolved, it represents an issue that Gerstle Park residents should be aware of, for our open space isn't just a neighborhood asset, but a community asset as well.

Many don't realize it, but our open space provides a wooded backdrop for the whole community to enjoy.

Turkey Update

The GPNA has contacted the SPCA, Marin Humane Society and Wildcare with regard to our neighborhood turkey. None of these organizations or the GPNA can do anything with regard to removing the turkey off of our streets. It is considered “wild” and cannot be relocated. It is unfortunate because this will probably not have a good ending. Please drive carefully and more importantly DO NOT feed this bird. It is a very likely that the turkey stays in our neighborhood because it is routinely being fed.

Home Safety Measures

With the holidays approaching, many of us will be traveling away from our homes to visit family and friends. Here are a few home safety tips to keep in mind before you go:

- ◇ Call your home security service if you have one and update your emergency contact list. Make sure the alarm company knows how to reach you while you are gone and who to call if any problems develop.
- ◇ Lock all windows and doors, including often forgotten bathroom windows and basement doors, before you leave. Invest in high-quality, name-brand deadbolt locks for all exterior doors.
- ◇ If you have double-hung windows, bolt the upper and lower sashes together or insert a metal bar in the track to prevent opening. To secure sliding glass doors, add a bolt lock or use a metal bar to block the door closed.
- ◇ Sign up for the US Postal Service's 'Hold Mail Service'.
- ◇ Leave a car parked in the driveway, and ask your neighbor to move it from time to time to make the house look lived-in. Unplug your automatic garage-door opener before you leave. A crook can accidentally open it with the right opener code.
- ◇ Leave blinds and curtains in their normal position so that your house doesn't have a closed-down look, but move expensive electronic equipment like televisions and computers away from windows where they are easily seen.
- ◇ Make sure the premiums on your homeowner's or renter's insurance policy are paid and your coverage is up to date.
